given to us in the Gospel of Matthew.



# The Lenten Season

Lent is a time that reminds us of the great love of God for us when He sent His only Son Jesus Christ to die for our sins. Bible verses tell us that humans have no ability to save themselves from spiritual and physical death after the fall of Adam. There is nothing a man can do to attain salvation, the sin of man is so great, but the love of God is greater. Lent helps us to remember and value the heavy price Jesus paid for our sin on the cross.

The Lenten Season is a time for us as believers to spiritually prepare for the celebration of Easter, which commemorates the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Lent is a period of forty days during which the believer can take extra time reading and studying God's Word and in prayer. It is a time of self-denial; a time to draw closer to the Lord by putting extra time and effort into Scripture reading and prayer, taking the time from other things that one might normally be involved in each day.

It is my hope that you will set aside extra time this Lenten Season for reflection, scripture, and prayer. Here are some passages to get you started:

#### 1) Matthew 6:16-18 - Keep a Secret

"And when you fast, do not look gloomy like the hypocrites...But when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face, that your fasting may not be seen by others but by your Father who is in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will reward you. (Matthew 6:16-18)

No need to tell everybody what you've given up for Lent—if you've given up anything. Keep it in secret. It's a secret between you and God. What could be more powerful than a secret like that?

### 2) 1 Peter 5:6 - Reveal Your Struggle

Humble yourselves, therefore, under the mighty hand of God so that at the proper time he may exalt you. (1 Peter 5:6)

Humility gets a bad rap in our culture. After all, aren't you supposed to let the world know how great you are so that you get some credit for all the good stuff you're doing? What if you actually revealed how <u>much you struggle</u>, even in your faith? Be guided by this Lent Bible verse. God can help us when we let God know how helpless we are.

## 3) Isaiah 58:6-7 - Take on Something

Is this not the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of wickedness, to undo the straps of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry and bring the homeless poor into your house..." (Isaiah 58:6-7)

Giving up something to celebrate Lent? You could also do as these verses suggest: <u>take on something</u>. Volunteer at that soup kitchen. Make a donation to your favorite charity. Donate some clothing or food for the poor. Giving can be another way of doing a <u>Lenten fast</u>. Taking on as you give up.

#### 4) Mark 1:12-13 - Find Your Wilderness

At once the Spirit sent him out into the wilderness, and he was in the wilderness forty days, being tempted by Satan. He was with the wild animals, and angels attended him." (Mark 1:12-13)

The gospel of Mark is so succinct. In two verses the writer describes all that happened to Jesus for those 40 days. We often get fixated on how Jesus went without food but notice here how the wilderness part of the experience was also crucial. To be alone. To be tested. To be with the wild animals *and* the angels. Before Jesus could begin His ministry, He needed that <u>wilderness time</u>. Can we not find a way to do the same as we look to grow in faith? Look for a Lenten retreat in your community.

#### 5) Colossians 2:16-17 - Honor Your Choice

Therefore let no one pass judgment on you in questions of food and drink, or with regard to a festival or a new moon or a Sabbath. These are a shadow of the things to come, but the substance belongs to Christ. (Colossians 2:16-17)

Okay, so maybe you gave up desserts for Lent, and now <u>Easter</u> is coming, and you can't wait to gorge on some jelly-beans or chocolate eggs. There's always going to be some worthy soul out there who will say, "Shouldn't you just give up those things anyway, all year round?" You can respond with this Lent Bible verse. It's not about what's healthy or not. It's about Christ. You made that choice for Lent to remember God. And to honor God.

# 6) Daniel 9:3 – Seek Inward Things

Then I turned my face to the Lord God, seeking him by prayer and pleas for mercy with fasting and sackcloth and ashes. (Daniel 9:3)

All these outward things we do for Lent, the fasting, the time of silence and stillness, even wearing some different clothes, they are simply ways to help us do the inward things. That is to seek God in <u>Lenten prayers</u>, asking for God's mercy.

#### 7) John 3:16 – Remember His Sacrifice

For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. (John 3:16)

This was what came out of Jesus's wilderness experience. This was what all those trials gave Him the <u>inner strength</u> to share with the world, even as He knew what suffering would be ahead.


